

GENDERED DRIVERS of violence against women:

CONDONING of violence against women MEN'S CONTROL of decisionmaking and limits to women's independence

OL STEREOTYPED constructions of masculinity and femininity DISRESPECT towards women and male peer relations that emphasise aggression

Gender inequality sets the NECESSARY SOCIAL CONTEXT



Reinforcing factors – Can increase frequency and severity of violence against women, but do not themselves drive such violence

- Condoning of violence in general
- Experience of, and exposure to, violence
- Weakening of pro-social behaviour, especially harmful use of alcohol
- Socio-economic inequality and discrimination
- 'Backlash' factors (increases in violence when male dominance, power or status is challenged).

Ongoing impacts of colonisation for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, families and communities

colonisation sets the underlying contents

The intersection between these multiple drivers results in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women experiencing disproportionate levels of violence, with particularly severe and complex impacts

Proven and promising techniques for primary prevention

Proven techniques – demonstrated reductions in future perpetration and/or experience of violence in longitudinal evaluations

Promising techniques – implementation has resulted in significant improvements against the drivers of violence against women

Direct participation programs



Bystander Training





Engage individuals directly to build knowledge and skills for equal, respectful non-violent relationships

Community Mobilisation and Strengthening



Mobilises, supports and builds the capacity of communities themselves to address violence against women and the social norms that make it acceptable.

Organisational Development



Supports a **whole-of-organisation** approach to prevent violence against women – looking at **both internal and external** methods of promoting gender equality


Uses a range of communication media to raise awareness of drivers of violence against women. There are various positive evaluations of the impact of communications and social marketing but only when implemented in a sustained way.

Civil society advocacy

FAIR AGENDA

Builds collective momentum and encourages governments, organisations, corporations and communities to take action to prevent violence against women. Can also include skills training, capacity building and leadership programs.
